The concept of Backdrop and Local is not new to filmmaking, it's something that has existed in the storytelling process for centuries. Whether it's a theatre, literature or films, setting has played a crucial role in creating environment, evoking emotions and setting the mood. In cinema, this concept expands to a new dimension considering the visual and auditory worlds to create the most interactive and dynamic storytelling experience.

### *Backdrop:*

The meaning of a backdrop can vary from one area to another. Basically, it's the background or environment against which something is set. It helps make the main event more visible and understandable. The traditional meaning of backdrop is a huge photographic painting or backing seen in the background of a scene. With the context of films, backdrop is the physical, geographical or environmental background in which the narrative occurs. It encompasses the more extensive historical, cultural, and social factors that influence the movie's characters and plot. By setting the tale in a familiar or different background helps the narrative to develop a sense of depth and authenticity

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*Locale:*

The physical area where a particular scene or a series of scenes in a film takes place is referred to as the “Locale” of the film. This can be a real or a fictional place where filmmakers ground their story. The place where the characters talk, the road they travel, and the house they live in, everything contributes to the environment of the story. The locale can have a huge impact on the tone and aesthetic of the movie. The locale provides the audience with visual indications about the lifestyles, personalities, and potential difficulties of the characters. It also affects how the characters interact with their surroundings.

In nutshell, the backdrop is broader concept which infuses overall atmosphere and context of films while locale is small and precise area where the story unfolds against the backdrop. Both components aid in bringing the audience into the story's universe and adding to the film's immersive experience.

*Problem Statement*

The traditional approach of film analysis focuses on actors' performances, cinematography, action, music, and costumes, neglecting the importance of Backdrop and Locale, considering them as merely a passive visual frame rather than active contributors to the films. Backdrop and Locale are the silent narrators of the cinematic world. When created and executed properly, they can convey meaning, idea and context to the narrative without uttering a single word. For instance, the location of the deserted land speaks about the emptiness and isolation of the character, while the green forest could suggest the growth and rejuvenation. In James Cameron's Titanic, the main backdrop, the ship Titanic, through its various sections of accommodations, from opulent first class to narrow third class compartments, narrates the social hierarchy and class division of that era. Filmmakers also utilize these elements to convey a metaphorical meaning in the narrative to add depth to it. For instance, the school for the blind and deaf depicted by director Sanjay Leela Bhansali in his film Black, becomes a metaphor for the loneliness and suffering of the blind and deaf protagonist Mischell. This setting highlights the gap between Michell's mental world and the world around her depicting her isolation from society.

Similarly, film's mood, tone and atmosphere are also influenced by its backdrop and locale. On a rainy night, an old decayed mansion evokes the feeling of fear and mystery. On the other hand, a lively and cheerful street environment with honking vehicles and bustling crowd creates a carefree and energetic atmosphere, mood and tone.

*Impact on Characters*

Backdrop and locale can be great contributors to shaping up character's behavior, personality, growth, motivation and goal. A character who grew up in a rustic, rural environment may be perceived as more grounded and in touch with nature, he may have a different set of values and abilities as compare to someone who grew up in an urban environment or high-tech city who might look ambitious and fast-paced. The effect of the surroundings can be reflected in their accent, dialect, social and cultural values too. In Gully Boy, director Zoya Akhtar utilized the real location of the slum area of Mumbai called 'Dharavi'. This real location plays a vital role in shaping the personality and behavior of the characters. The adverse

conditions and harsh reality of slums make the characters street-smarts, self-reliant and tough enough to fight against the odds of life.

Berry Jenkins's *Moonlight* could be the best example to understand how the backdrop contributes to character's growth and development. In *Moonlight*, the neighborhoods of Miami form the backdrop of protagonist Chiron's life at three different development stages: Childhood, Adolescence, and Adulthood. His surroundings have a significant impact on his personal development and identity.

The environment and location can also have an impact on how characters interact with one another. For instance, the characters of film set in an isolated island, might rely on each other to survive, which can lead to some pretty unique relationships and conflicts between them.

### *Impact on Audience*

The backdrop and location in the film can trigger emotions and make the audience more invested in the character and story. The set of a horror film can be a dark, run-down haunted house decorated with props like swinging chandeliers, skins of dead animals hung on the walls, creaky floorboards and evil shadows, all of which can make the viewers more scared and anxious.

The *Movie Life of Pi*, is set against the backdrop of a vast ocean and the location of a lifeboat where the survival drama unfolds. The settings like a vast water body and an empty horizon, make the audience feel Pi's isolation and fear. At the same time, the endless dreamlike oceans create wonder and hope, connecting the audience to the film's spiritual tone.

Sometimes the settings of the films can create a sense of nostalgia and timelessness too. Many periods and historical films like in Ashutosh Gowariker's *Jodha-Akbar*, recreate the Mughal era of the 16th century through grand forts, vibrant costumes, and royal courts with minute details that seem so authentic that audiences feel connected to them even after centuries.

Similarly, the carefully constructed sets of the ancient Indus Valley Civilization, in the film *Mohenjo-Daro*, transport the viewers to a bygone era. The rustic colour and architectural designs inspired by the original excavated site make the audience more invested in protagonist's journey.

Sometimes, locations make a narrative more relatable to audience and sometimes they provide escape to them. For example, location such as metro city or a food joint can be more relatable to audience as it reflects their daily lives and on the other hand foreign locations transport the viewers to a new world providing an escape from their mundane lives.
